Taking 25 minutes cable car ride from Tung Chung to Ngong Ping Plateau (520-metre-high) offering stunning views.</p> <p>Stroll through the culturally themed Ngong Ping Village, then comes to the Great Bronze Buddha Statue, at 26 meters tall and 202 tons, it is the world's tallest, outdoor, seated, bronze statue of Buddha.</p> <p>Adjacent to the statue is Po Lin Monastery (Precious Lotus), founded by three monks in 1920 as a monastic retreat. Today it is a major religious enterprise, blessed with brightly decorated temples and floral garden.</p> <p>Enjoy a Chinese-style vegetarian lunch in the monastery.</p> <p>Taking the cable car from Ngong Ping back to Tung Chung</p> <p>Afternoon visit Citygate Outlets, There are over 150 international brands offering up to 90 percent discounts on original prices. Chinese Junk (Aqua Luna)

A Junk is a boat used in China. Junks usually have around two or three sails but sometimes four. Each mast is made of bamboo. Bamboo is used because it is so strong that you don't need very many ropes. The first Chinese junks were built in the Song dynasty between 960-1270, to trade with other countries. They traded from Taiwan to the Persian Gulf. Historians believe that at this time the Chinese were ready to colonize the world. However, all overseas trade was banned in the 1500s. Throughout China's history, junks were also used as war ships. Today many families live on junks, these families often use the junk as a way of making money.

Imbibe Hong Kong's history while enveloping in intoxicating harbor and skyline views on board a traditional Chinese junk, during 1 hour cruise will enable you to relax in style while enjoying the sights and sounds of Victoria Harbor.

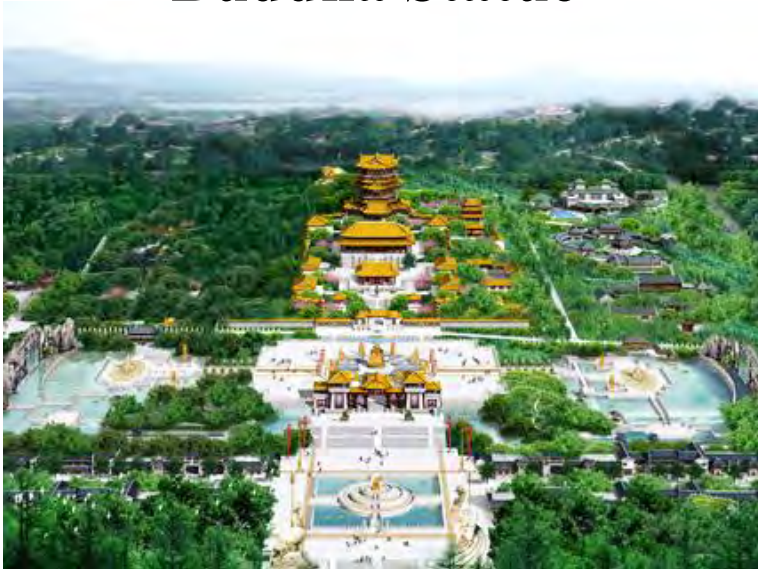


Visit Great Bronze Buddha Statue



The statue is located near Po Lin Monastery and symbolizes the harmonious relationship between man and nature, people and faith. Amiable face, big ears and open right hand suggest his wish of relieving people from their suffering. This statue is a crystallization of art of religion and high technology, designed and constructed by Chinese Aviation Design Department. There are three floors beneath the statue: the halls of the Universe, of Benevolent Merit and of Remembrance. A huge bell inscribed with images of Buddha is exhibited in the show room. It was set to ring every seven minutes and 108 times one day, meaning the release of 108 kind of human vexations.

Visit Great Bronze Buddha Statue



Adjacent to the statue is Po Lin Monastery (Precious Lotus), founded by three monks in 1920 as a monastic retreat. Today it is a major religious enterprise, blessed with brightly decorated temples and floral garden. A short walk away is the Wisdom Path where an ancient prayer is inscribed on a series of wooden columns set in a figure of eight to signify infinity.

Option: Stanley Market

Stanley Market is one of the must-go places for tourists when they visit Hong Kong. You will find an interesting array of little shops selling silk garments, sportswear, art, Chinese costume jewellery and souvenirs. While a bit "touristy" if you are a tourist it will certainly help you to cross off all the items on your souvenirs-to-buy-Aunt-Jane shopping list. A hard morning of shopping is also nicely finished off by a good lunch at one of the many restaurants, which are the reason that Hong Kong locals also frequent the area.

Into the Hong Kong Pulse by watching the HORSE RACING

Devised exclusively for overseas visitors, this tour entitles you to enter the Visitor's Box within the Members' Enclosure of the Royal Hong Kong Jockey Club where you may mix with the top echelons of Hong Kong society. Giant colour-display screens face the stands, so you never lose track of the horses. Sha Tin, once a tiny village on the shores of a shallow inlet, is now a bustling new town of more than half a million people. Built almost entirely on reclaimed land, the Sha Tin course is more than just a modern race track. Extensive landscaping of the infield has transformed it into one of Hong Kong's largest public parks, Penfold Park, enjoyed by thousands every weekend. The restaurant is located on the 5th floor of the Sha Tin Racecourse.

The marvel Hong Kong – Zhuhai - Macao Bridge and associated tunnels cross the Lingdingyang waterway. It is a construction of 22.9 kilometers of bridge, four tunnels and four artificial islands. The 55-km structure is the longest of its kind in the world and built with 420,000 metric tons of steel, enough to build 60 Eiffel Towers. British newspaper "The Guardian" named the mega structure one of its "seven wonders of the modern world near completion." The bridge will cut travel time from Hong Kong to both Zhuhai and Macao from the current three hours by road or one hour by sea to a half hour drive.

St. Paul's Ruins

The Ruins of St. Paul's (also known as Sam Ba Sing Tzik) stands adjacent to the famous Mount Fortress and Macau Museum. The front façade and the grand stone stairs are the only remains of the greatest church. First constructed in 1580, St. Paul's Church caught fire in 1595 and 1601. However, reconstruction started in 1602 soon after the church was burnt down. Completed in 1637, the church became the biggest Catholic Church in East Asia at that time. Unfortunately, a violent typhoon hit Macau in 1835 and the church caught fire for the third time leaving its glory a history. According to historical materials, St Paul's Church, built with white stones, had a grand vaulted roof. It had three magnificently decorated halls.



Senado Squareacau

The Historic Center of Macau, also known as the Centro Histórico de Macau is a collection of over twenty locations that witness the unique assimilation and co-existence of Chinese and Portuguese cultures in Macau, a former Portuguese colony. It represents the architectural legacies of the city's cultural heritage, including monuments such as urban squares, streetscapes, churches and temples.

In 2005 the Historic Centre of Macau was inscribed on the UNESCO World Heritage List, making it the 31st designated World Heritage site in China. It was described by UNESCO as: "with its historic street, residential, religious and public Portuguese and Chinese buildings, the historic centre of Macau provides a unique testimony to the meeting of aesthetic, cultural, architectural and technological influences from East and West," and "...it bears witness to one of the earliest and longest-lasting encounters between China and the West, based on the vibrancy of international trade."



A-Ma Temple

A-Ma Temple, located in the southeast of the Macau Peninsula, is the oldest temple here. Approximately four hundred years ago the Portuguese landed on a sea promontory near a temple. They asked the local inhabitants the name of the land, but the locals misunderstood, thinking that the Portuguese were asking for the name of the temple. So they answered 'Ma Ge'. Later, the Portuguese translated the name into 'Macau' and used it to refer to the land. The temple is one of the three famous Buddha halls in Macau.

The A-Ma Temple was constructed in the year of 1488 of the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644) to commemorate Mazu, the sacred sea goddess who blesses the fishermen.

Fun and Fortune in Macau



Gambling is Macau's biggest industry, and busloads arrive daily from mainland China to try their luck. In addition, many Hong Kongers arrive on weekends with the same aim. For many years, the Casino Lisboa was the most famous and a landmark well known to people outside Macau, but it is being eclipsed by Sands Casino which opened in 2004. Nevertheless, the original Casino Lisboa is still worth a visit as its halls contain many original antiques on display from the private collection of gambling tycoon Stanley Ho.

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Most casinos are located along the waterfront on the southern side of **Macau Peninsula**. North of the Lisboa is a strip with many smaller casinos, a number of hotels and bars, and quite a few restaurants.





Fun and Fortune in Macau

All this is going to be overtaken by the new development on the **Cotai Strip**, which is being made into "The Las Vegas Strip of the East". The biggest casino in the world, Venetian Macao, opened its doors in August 2007 and the not-much-smaller City of Dreams followed in 2009, with many more still to come. There are also several casinos on Taipa, including the Crown Macau.

There are ATMs available at either casino as well as Forex facilities to change your money. Gamblers are required to be at least 21 years of age, as of 1 November 2012 to be allowed to play. Interestingly, local civil servants are not allowed to enter the casinos with the exception of the first three days of the Chinese new year.

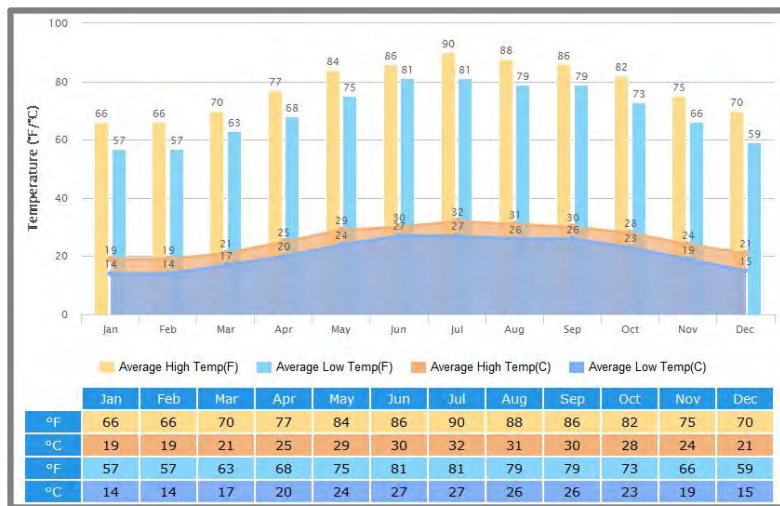


About Hong Kong

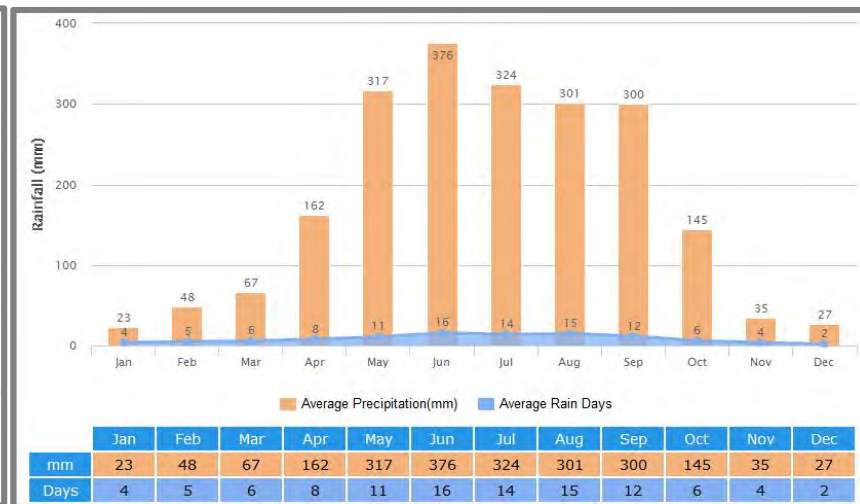

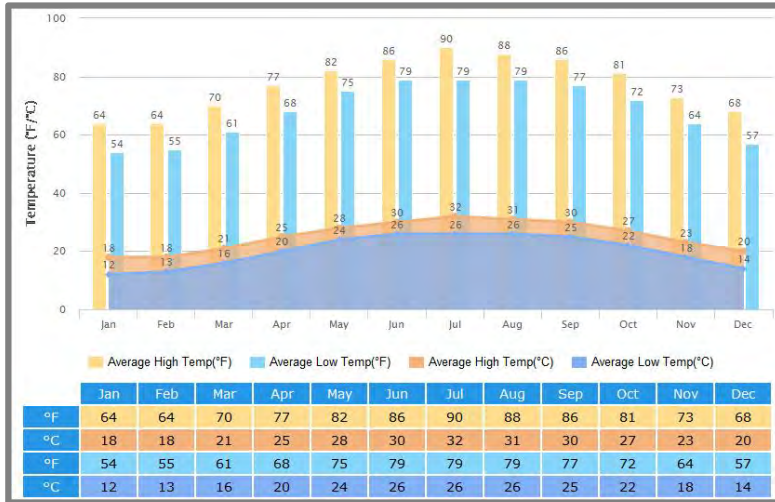


About Macau

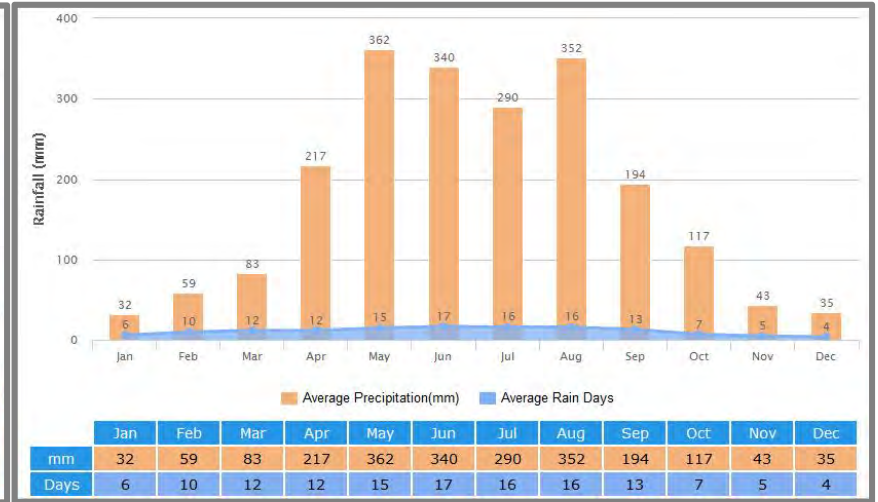
